God Bless us all.



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ST. FRANCIS XAVIER



Francis Xavier was born on 7th April 1506 in Navarre (a part of Spain) to a noble family. His father worked in the king’s court. His childhood was one of privilege and from a young age he had an aptitude for learning. He was found to be complying, humorous and a good genius. In 1525 his parents sent him to study

at the University of Paris, where he obtained a master’s degree in Philosophy and taught at the Beauvais College. He was expected to become a noble man and a knight himself.

At the University of Paris, Francis Xavier was sharing his accommodation with a young priest, Ignatius of Loyola, who was a former soldier. Ignatius had experienced a religious conversion while recovering from a wound; he studied the gospel and the life and personality of Christ. He asked three questions to himself: what have I done for Christ, what am I doing for Christ, what I ought to be doing for Christ. These questions helped to change his own life. He did his utmost to convince Francis Xavier about his religious beliefs. But Francis Xavier, being ambitious, made tough resistance and bantered and rallied Ignatius on all occasions, ridiculing the meanness and poverty in which he lived, as a degenerate lowness of the soul. Ignatius repaid his contempt, with meekness and kindness and asked Francis “What does it profit a man, if he loses his own soul but gains the whole world?” This had a great impact on Francis, and he slowly began to realise the emptiness of earthly greatness and found himself powerfully touched by the heavenly things. Ignatius guided him to perfection. Thereafter, Francis began to have a deep encounter with Jesus; he gave up everything for Christ on the cross, for it became more desirable to him than all the glories of the world. He entered the study of divinity for three years; he glorified God in all possible means. He decided to devote his entire life for the salvation of souls.

Francis Xavier set sail to the east as a Missionary, on the orders of Ignatius. Upon his arrival in India in the coastal villages, he preached about Jesus Christ and brought his message to the pagans, who at first did not receive him quite well. But by his holy zeal, he performed many miracles and God was pleased to manifest his truth to them. And the sick recovered in great numbers. Thousands began to flock to him and were willing to accept the Christian faith. He began to instruct and baptise them. Hence began the huge conversion. He expelled devils from those who were possessed and delivered them from their cruel subjection.

Francis was consumed with an insatiable thirst for the salvation of souls and Christ’s kingdom on earth. He is the model of missionaries and is hailed as one of the greatest apostles of the east. There was no anger or impatience found in him, for he rejoiced in afflictions and sufferings. He said “anyone who suffers for Christ will ever find it worse than death to live without the cross.”

CHILDREN'S DAY CELEBRATION AT ST. PATRICK'S

“ Let the children come to me, do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of God.”- Mark 10:14

Children are our most precious, valuable and fragile resource for the future. They are the hope of tomorrow. Their quality and personality will determine the destiny of the nation. The celebration of Children's day is one of the right steps towards securing their bright future.

We, at St. Patrick's, celebrated Children's day on the 13th of November. A special Mass for children was organized at the regular 8:30am Mass, at which all the faith formators were present. Children attended in large numbers and the Mass was celebrated by Fr Julius who is the coordinator for Faith formation. The Mass Readings were done by the Faith Formators, and special prayers for the children were offered during Prayers of the Faithful. At the end of the Mass the priest pronounced a special blessing over the children. The children performed an action song for the recessional hymn. At the Catechism assembly, the Faith Formators performed an action song, as all the children joined in with joy and enthusiasm. Sweets were distributed to all as a special treat.

“Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.” – Mathew 18:3.

It was indeed a great pleasure to see the children come in large numbers and occupy the front rows of the church. We felt that every Sunday should be celebrated as Children's day!

As parents, mentors and teachers it is important to advise our children about participating in Mass every Sunday. They must grow up to be an active part of the Parish and develop a sense of belonging to the larger parish community. “Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it.” – Proverbs 22:6.

Every Sunday at 8.30 am is the children's Mass followed by Catechism classes. It is important to encourage our children to attend this Mass and the classes. The children are given an opportunity to do the Mass Readings, with proper training. They are also encouraged to join the altar servers group or the choir if they are interested.

THE ADVENT WREATH

Advent is the time before Christmas, extending over four Sundays, when we prepare for the Lord's coming. It is a time of joyful waiting – when we wait for the coming of Christ in several ways – his birth in time, in our everyday lives, and some day in his coming in glory at the end of time.

One of the more popular symbols of advent is the Advent Wreath, which consists of four candles – three purple (the liturgical colour of prayer, penance and sacrifice) and one pink- arranged within a wreath made of evergreen boughs. The Advent wreath has a beautiful symbolism that helps us in our preparation for Christmas.



The circle of the wreath represents God's eternity and unity. The evergreens are a symbol of enduring life – the everlasting life found in Christ.

The four candles in the advent wreath correspond to the four Sundays of Advent and have a symbolism of their own. The candles are lit in sequence on each Sunday of Advent. The light of the candles signifies Christ, the Light of the world, who will come into the world at Christmas.

The **first** candle, which is lit on the first Sunday, is called the 'prophet's candle' and is meant to signify the Hope of Jesus' coming.

The **second** 'Bethlehem candle' symbolizes Faith and reminds us of Mary's and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.

The **third** 'Shepherd's candle', is the pink candle and symbolizes the Joy the world experienced at the birth of Jesus.

The **fourth**, 'Angel's candle' symbolizes Peace, reminding us of the message of the Angels at Jesus' birth: “Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men with whom he is pleased.”

THE JOY OF GIVING



On my drive towards Malur to locate “Happy Fields” – a gated community, I came upon Vishranti which is a home for senior citizens run by Mrs. Padma Srinivasan the Managing Trustee of Vishranti Trust.

Padma told us how she lost her husband in a road accident when she was just 28 years old and had to struggle to bring up her young son and daughter. ITI gave her a job as a clerk and she rose to become the Finance Manager before retiring.

Once her children were wellsettled, she longed to open a home for senior citizens, to reach out to others in need. She sold her house in Richmond Town and with the proceeds set up the Vishranti Trust. She even convinced her daughter to retire from her high-profile job and help her to build the three-storied structure which is home to 12 couples.

The top floor comprises 2 dormitories, one for boys and one for girls. These are reserved for orphans she plans to foster, as an old grandmother like her loves to be with children, says a beaming Padma.

Hers is a story of the joy of giving. Some of us give of our time and talent. Some offer support in terms of money through scholarships, free-ships, equipment, etc., But the best of all is to give of ourselves as this brings true joy.

Bill and Melinda Gates, Narayana and Sudha Murthy and thousands of others have realized the joy of giving.

Christmas is that special time of the year when we appreciate how our Father gave us His son Jesus, as the most precious gift we could receive.
