Rajesh served in the parish office for over 7 years, till his death on 28th Dec. 2014. Always a cheerful, accommodating and willing worker, he spent most of his day at St. Patrick's, never saying 'no' to any service that was requested of him. A young lad of 19 years when he was first appointed, immature and with no sense of direction, he allowed himself to be taught and moulded by those whom he worked under. He grew in maturity and responsibility over the years and developed a good rapport with all who interacted with him. Any advice given to him was always appreciated and accepted in the right spirit and he never hesitated

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ENRICH YOUR MARRIAGE - THE MARRIAGE ENCOUNTER PROGRAMME

The Marriage Encounter (ME) is a 44-hour programme conducted over a weekend, where couples get away from the distractions of everyday life and focus on each other. Instead of simply listening to lectures, they actually focus on improving their marriage. Couples discover their vocation and their calling to be a sign of God's love in this world. They learn intimate ways of communication, which renews and rekindles their love for each other and their matrimonial sacrament comes alive. In a strong endorsement of the programme, St. Pope John Paul II said "I place much of my hope for the future in Worldwide Marriage Encounter."

Let's hear what Arathi and Bansy, a couple with 2 children, who are now resource persons at the Family Welfare Centre of the Bangalore Archdiocese, have to say about how the Marriage Encounter programme made their 'normal' marriage great.

Arathi: Both Bansy and I come from Hindu backgrounds. We both had our personal experience of Jesus and accepted Him as our Lord and saviour separately, four years apart from each other.

Bansy: We were married in 1999 - but both got baptized together in the year 2002. Thereafter the Lord blessed us with two beautiful children.

Arathi: In the beginning, life seemed beautiful and rosy and a bright future lay ahead. But as the responsibilities of bringing up children and work took its toll, our relationship went into a downward spiral. Day-by-day our fights increased.

Bansy: Arathi having lived in a hostel from her early childhood, and I having been brought up in a close-knit family, were very different personalities. I did not understand marriage was a Sacrament and my objective was to lord it over my wife. I had seen my father being the 'Boss' and the head of the family and thought it the right thing to do. He never helped in the household chores and with the children. My mother not only did all the chores, but patiently waited on him. When my wife failed to be like my mother, it led to strife and even bitterness.

Arathi: Having grown up in a hostel, I was fiercely independent and believed in equality in all matters.

Due to this difference in our upbringing and background, there was a lot of confusion in our roles as a couple. Looking after the children alone, I would invariably be tired and worn out by the time Bansy got back home from work, which was almost always after 9.00 pm. I would be irritable and vent all my frustration on him. As the children grew up, the differences in our disciplining styles came to the fore. I, being a strict parent, wouldn't hesitate to scold or beat the children. Bansy would hate that and object to my style of disciplining - even in the presence of the children. That would upset me even more. Due to the baggage we carried we were not in a position to help ourselves.

Bansy: When we first attended the ME weekend, we both knew we could do with some help. Arathi's main complaint was my late hours of work which barely gave us time to talk and listen to each other. ME has enabled us to share and communicate our feelings to each other in the form of dialogue. After we did ME, I understood that matrimony is a continuous call to love my spouse.

Arathi: Though we had our differences we always thought we had a good marriage. We always apologized and prayed together. We used to give our marriage a 7/10 but now ME has given us the opportunity to look deeply into our relationship and now we give full marks to our marriage. Now as I feel the understanding from his side, I don't feel rejected and as a result the bouts of anger have decreased in intensity and frequency.

Arathi and Bansy: So we do hope some of you have identified with us as we have shared our own experience. Now there is an opportunity for you to deepen your own marriage. Come and Experience it!!!

THIS IS OUR FAITH: SOLA SCRIPTURA - IS THE BIBLE ENOUGH?

Daniel & Theo are two friends who are God-fearing Catholics; but Daniel has been having few doubts with regards to some catholic teachings. This Sunday, Daniel was particularly vexed about the homily of the parish priest and as they bumped into each other after Mass, Theo being a good old friend of Daniel, knew straight away that Daniel was being troubled by something and began by having a go at Daniel. Let's see how their conversation went.

Theo: Hi Danny, what's up? You look like a man filled with the joy of the Holy Spirit this morning. I can say for sure, it's the effect of the Mass. *(Theo was beaming).*

Daniel: Come on Theo, don't bug me. You know very well that I don't like it when priests start reading from the Bishop's letters, important as they may be, on any subject during the Mass. Why can't they just read the Bible and interpret as the Lord leads them?

Theo: Danny, do you know that the New Testament was written by pretty much the first Bishops? This should give you an idea of how important the role of the Bishop is in the church. But before I delve deeper into the importance and role of the Bishop, let me tell you something about Sacred Scriptures, aka The Bible; just like a round stool must have at least 3 legs to stand firm, the Catholic Church too stands on the triple foundation of the Scripture, Sacred Tradition and the Magisterium.

Daniel *(a bit more irritated now):* What? Why not the Bible alone? That's The Word of God.

Theo: Can you tell me where is it written in the Bible that you can find answers to all faith and church related issues in the Bible alone?

Daniel: Hmmm, I don't think I can recollect.

Theo: You can't recollect because it isn't written anywhere in the Bible. In fact, at the end of the Gospel of John it is expressly written, ***"But there are also many other things which Jesus did; were every one of them to be written, I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be***

written" which implies that there existed matters even during the times of the apostles, which though not written about anywhere, we still need to know. We surely need the Bible as it is, but we also need the Tradition, as passed on by the apostles - the unwritten deposit of faith, carefully handed down the generations till today. Let me remind you of the verse from 2Thes 2:15. ***"So then, brethren, stand firm and hold to the traditions which you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by letter"*** and also 1Cor 11:2 where Paul writes ***"I commend you because you remember me in everything and maintain the traditions even as I have delivered them to you."***

Daniel: But, shouldn't we believe in the Bible alone? After all, it is the Word of God!

Theo: But the Bible itself says that there is more to the Christian faith than what it contains. There is another aspect to it. Do you know that the Bible as we see, know and read today, did not even exist in the same form for the first few centuries after the resurrection? You see, in the first few centuries, there was no such thing as the 27 books of the New Testament, including the four Gospels, all neatly bound and called "The Bible". All these 27 books, along with many other good as well as unauthentic books/epistles, were being read from in various churches in the first 2-3 centuries separately (i.e. not bound together). So if Christians have to believe in the Bible alone, then does that make all believers of the first three to four centuries non-Christians? Definitely not!

Daniel: Now you've got me thinking, bro. But, who got these 27 books and the Old Testament together?

Theo: Aah... that's where the Magisterium comes into the picture. That's another story, perhaps for another day. It will give you an even better idea of why the Bishop is so important for the church. It's a bit late in the morning already and I have to buy some groceries before I get back home, else my wife will not let me in. Bye Daniel.

Daniel: Thanks Theo, seems like the Catholic Church is a lot deeper than I thought. Looking forward to next time. Bye.
