JUBILEE OF MERCY

The Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy, convoked by Pope Francis, began on 8th December, 2015 and will be closed on 20th November 2016. The Jubilee is a special year in the Church's history, and the most notable feature of a Jubilee Year is the granting of indulgences. The faithful are exhorted to live out this year more fully by practicing the works of mercy, which from ancient times have been classified as the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

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SPECIAL FAMILY RETREAT

St. Patrick's organized a five-day Special Family Retreat between the 23rd and 27th of November. Having attended a Retreat after many years, I had a certain expectation regarding the format and content of the teaching that would be imparted. I was not disappointed in the least! The first day was so interesting that I looked forward to attending the next four days with keen anticipation and not with a sense of obligation.

Each day's topicwasbased on key aspects that could help build and enrich one's family life. The Preacher, Fr. John Sudeep made the sessions attention-grabbing with audio visual presentations, great examples and stories. On one of the days, a lay person gave us a powerful and moving testimony of what true commitment and love in a marriage really means and entails. A part of Day 3 was shared by another Preacher - Fr Amarnath Dinesh, Parish Priest of St. John the Evangelist Church, who also very distinctly and interestingly spoke about women and men from the Bible, whose simple characteristics were very enriching and easy to emulate!

The fourth day's session was devoted to bringing out the rich and profound meaning of the Eucharistic celebration. The Animator spent most of the two-anda-half hour session celebrating Mass (which on other days preceded the Talk), explaining in detail what each part of the Mass signifies viz. the Collect Prayer, the Readings, Sanctus, Consecration etc. and how we could participate to enjoy a deep fruitful experience. He touched upon the power in the Eucharist - to heal, to edify and to strengthen. I don't think there was anyone in the congregation who even once impatiently looked at their watch and wondered when the Mass would end!

The fifth day was the highlight of the Retreat. Married people were urged to attend he session along with their spouses. We were led into a beautiful Way of the

Cross, supported by scenes from the movie 'The Passion of the Christ' directed by Mel Gibson. For every Station, a reflection followed, that applied to couples and families and ended with a purposeful prayer. A wooden cross was erected near the altar on the first day of the Mission and anyone was free to stick a post-it note, on which was written out their deepest needs. Needless to say, by the end of Day 5 there was not an inch of free space on the Cross! At the final Benediction, we collectively lifted up every single intention to the Lord and the fervent supplication of the 150 plus participating congregation was palpable.

Counselors were available for anyone who felt the need to talk and discuss their issues more personally and in depth.

The Clergy of St Patrick's and the Liturgy Committee provided an opportunity to the Parishioners and others who attended the Mission, to partake of a rewarding experience, to enter the Advent season in a fitting manner. The daily 2 hour evening sessions over 5 days made it convenient for interested people to attend. The Mission was much appreciated by all. We look forward to many more such programs in the future.

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BIBLE FEST AT ST. PATRICK'S

For the first time in our Sunday Catechism class at St. Patrick's church, with the initiative and under the guidance of Fr. Sunny Richard, we celebrated the Bible Fest on the 29th of November. We were divided into 5 groups named after the first 5 books of the Bible-Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy. Each group had about thirty children taken from all the classes and was assisted by two teachers. Children from the 1st to 4thstandard were prepared for a Fancy Dress Competition, while students from standard 5 to 7 were prepared for a Story Telling Competition. Children from standard seven and above had to prepare for the skit based on a topic from their respective segment.

I was in the Deuteronomy group. Ms. Juliana D'Cunha and Ms. Tessa Jose were our teachers, and they were assisted by Priyanka. Our group was divided into subgroups for the bible quiz and each sub-group had a leader. In the initial stage none of the older kids, including me, showed any interest. The younger children paid attention and were obedient. Later on, after a couple of classes, we became serious and the teachers were successful in making us work as a team. The smaller children were guided to choose their characters and take part in the Fancy Dress competition. The children from 5th to 7th Std. were guided on the stories they had to prepare for the final event. The script for our skit was written by Priyanka, and we improvised with every practice. I was not very confident of the result, but on the final day every item that was put up, including ours, was very well organized and was informative too.

The skit put up by the Numbers group was themed on Abraham pleading for Sodom and Gomorrah. The Leviticus group showcased Jacob and his twelve sons, which was themed on jealousy. The Deuteronomy group enacted the Ten Commandments and how they relate to everyday life.

A good number of children took part in the fancy dress and it was wonderful to see them all dressed as characters from the Bible. It truly felt like the characters from the Bible had come to life! Due to the time constraint, the Story Telling Competition was conducted a week earlier. Only the winners were given a chance to narrate their story on stage on the final day. We also had a Bible exhibition on the same day and the best three were awarded prizes. The events were judged by Ms. Bernadette Pinto, Ms. Shibani Perincherry, Ms. Jean Rego and Ms. Tara Swaminathan.

The overall experience of the Bible Fest was amazing. It helped us to learn the Bible in a very creative way. It also gave us an opportunity to work as a team. We are grateful to Fr. Sunny for this initiative. I gratefully acknowledge the efforts and the valuable time given by the teachers and volunteers, and appreciate this novel way of approaching the Bible.
